MORE THAN JUST DELICIOUS



nutrition and compete in various food contests. We had 36 4-H members register for
this event from 5 different clubs. The Large Decorated Cookie category was the most
entered category. Among the entries were cookies inspired by Harry Potter, The Warriors Series, Game Knight 999 Series, as well as Boss Baby, Jumanji, Wonder, and The
Beetles Movie. One highlight of the event was the new Impromptu Food Challenge
where participants competed in teams to prepare a dish on the spot (see below).

The educational stations included stations where participants learned about

Rethinking their Drink choices based on sugar content, a Nutrition Label Scavenger Hunt,
Spice identification, Vegetable judging, Napkin folding and a science station where participants

got to use microscopes to identify salt and sugar crystals. The Cloverbuds (primary 4-H) had their own station with crafts, kitchen science and their own Brown Bag Food challenge. This year we had a community service station where participants made stamped Valentine's Day cards and Valentine's crafts

for Meals on Wheels who will distribute them to recipients during Valentine's week.

Participants will learn physical computing using general purpose input/output (GPIO) pins with Arduino, control of Mindstorms NXT/EV3 and Linkbot robots, and how to bring physical computing and free C-STEM resources into their teaching of STEM, computer science, making, and robotics in the after school program. It's That Time of Year!

- **Fashion Revue** is March 9th. Come see the fashion parade and join in the fun for this year's Friday night event.
- It might seem early, but it's time to start thinking about club elections. Start by forming a nominating committee at the next club meeting. The nominating committee is responsible for explaining what each officer's responsibilities are and ask members to help fill each position with the best member for the job. If you are interested in a position, ask the current officer what they do to see if you would be a good fit. Elections are typically held in May, so that the new officers can start strong at the beginning of the 4-H year. Each club is different, so if you have questions, ask your club leader.
- Policy Reminder: Social Media

The increased use of social media – including texting, FaceBook, Twitter, YouTube and Instagram – has created new issues in the 4-H program. While a valuable tool in communication, there is an unexpected opportunity for bullying and inappropriate use of language via these technologies among both youth members and adults affiliated with the program. This is a serious issue and we encourage leaders and youth to discuss online behaviors and boundaries, and the increasing legal consequences relating to inappropriate use of technology enacted by the State of California. The 4-H Code of Conduct applies to online technologies. 4-H members and adult volunteers will be held accountable for failure to adhere to the 4-H Code of Conduct.
