PAST AND FUTURE IN 4-H

My name is Georgetta. The voice you hear when you call (805) 645-1740 with your 4-H questions and requests is mine. I have been working here at the Ventura County 4-H Office for over 12 years, and through these 12 years, I have watched many 4-H members grow in confidence, knowledge, and skills even as they matured physically. Only a few of you folks might know, but I was enrolled as a 4-H member 40 years ago in Tulare County, California.

Both our world and 4-H have become more diverse and also much more complex over those 4 decades, but the reasons 4-H was created still apply. 4-H was originally designed to bring knowledge to families living on farms in the U.S. in the early part of this century. The Land Grant Universities decided that the best way to bring new ideas, knowledge, and technology to parents was through their children. 4-H is, and has always been, a family-oriented program with our adult/parent volunteers sharing knowledge with youth and using the knowledge and resources of the University to improve their lives. 4-H is part of the University of California and is delivered to benefit our youth through the cooperation of the University, Ventura County, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (that's why they call it Cooperative Extension!).

The motto 4-H is "Learn by Doing". When I was in 4-H those many years ago, my project was a heifer. I didn't just buy my heifer a few months prior to tagging day; I raised my heifer from a week old calf who had to be bottle-fed several times a day, wiped down frequently, and her soiled straw replaced often. 4-H was about learning how to care for my project animal, training her follow me on a halter, making sure I kept accurate and complete records in my Project Report of how much she ate and how fast she was growing and gaining weight. We had a 4-H Field Day at our house one year where all the project heifers were checked over carefully and groomed. They showed all the kids in the project how to make the heifers stand properly for the judges, what to look for in conformation, and then answered any questions we had. My mom and dad provided a barbeque lunch for everyone and we had a wonderful time.

We had a fabulous 4-H program in Tulare County in the late 60's. Every 4-H member in my club took part (and had fun!) in the County Field Day musical skit, everyone in my club was required to do a Demonstration at Presentation Day (mine was on a new-fangled item – powdered milk!) We had the benefit of the full 4-H experience – our club was also active in community service (I went door to door collecting for the Heart Fund each year) – we never just focused on raising an animal for the fair auction. Don't you think that the 4-H experience should be more than that? Youth who join 4-H and sign up for just a market animal project are missing soooooo much! It makes me sad when I sit at my 4-H computer and enter enrollment after enrollment, each showing a returning member is signing up for just one project, the same single project he or she has done for the past 3 or more years!

I didn't do just a heifer project in 4-H – I participated in many club activities such as our Judging Contest (scored well enough to compete at the next level!) and also completed 3 Crafts projects. I was only in 4-H for 2 years (7th & 8th grade) but it made a lasting impression on me and gave me many good memories! I am certain that part of the reason I was offered this job (and also why I accepted it) is that I had been a 4-H member! My favorite part of this job is helping people find the resources they need to make their projects successful, whether it is curriculum, websites, expert advice on a specific question, or whatever other question I am asked.

The goals of 4-H are to teach leadership and life skills and to encourage good citizenship by being honest, polite, and playing fair, community service by helping others, showing concern and consideration for your family, your fellow 4-H club members, your neighbors, your community, and ultimately, your world.

STATEWIDE 4-H OPPORTUNITIES!!!

The California 4-H International Exchange Program will offer outbound exchange experiences to Australia, Finland, and Japan during the summer of 2008. Each of these month-long educational exchanges offers a host family experience that will provide an insider's view of the country. Information and registration materials are available in your county 4-H office or on-line at: http://www.ca4h.org/exchange/index.asp. Deadline for application is January 18, 2008.

The dates for the 2008 4-H equine state events are as follows:

April 5 & 6 - The State 4-H Horse Classic - Equine Educational Contests, CSU Fresno. To participate 4-Hers must be enrolled in the horse project by February 5th (60 days).

June 26-29 - The State 4-H Horse Classic - Horse Show, Santa Cruz Fairgrounds, Watsonville. To participate, 4-Hers must be enrolled in the horse project and own or lease their horse by February 28th (120 days). More information about these events will be posted on the equine web site in December and January.

It is not too late to register for the California Focus Program. California Focus is a unique 4-H Citizenship educational experience that combines hands-on participation in workshops, debates, and simulations with outstanding speakers and visits to historical, cultural, and governmental sites. California's capital city, Sacramento, becomes a "living classroom" for this fiveday, action packed adventure.

As a citizen of "Sierra Cascade" you will register to vote, conduct a political campaign, elect constitutional offices, analyze the needs and issues of your district, and enact legislation with the goal of securing the governor's signature to make your bill a law.

Legislative appointments at the Capitol will allow delegates to meet face-to-face with their senators and assembly person to discuss current issues, learn how proposals are funded, and advocate for issues critical to them and their fellow constituents. An overview of the executive branch is presented by the governor's staff. A court clerk guides delegates through the judicial process while delegates sit in the chambers of the state supreme court.

Tours are provided of historical, economic, political, and cultural significance to such locales as Old Sacramento, the Governor's Mansion, The Golden State Museum, Sutter's Fort, the Discovery Museum, the Railroad Museum, the Crocker Art Museum or the Sacramento City Cemetery.

Delegates extend their learning as they prepare and present a "Plan of Action" to implement back home in

their respective communities. Outstanding plans are showcased at the conference and an award is given each year for the one that is judged the most effective. California Focus can be the beginning of a life of public participation that leaves you with a strong determination to become involved with the political process.
