Power Up Your Victory Garden!

My work as an historian of wartime gardening efforts is a small piece of my larger work as an historian of the American homefront during wartime. When talking about the power Victory Gardens had on the American homefront in particular, it's easy to focus on the positive, and I do. There's the fact that Americans increased food production and improved their diets during a period of challenge. That they used gardening as a way to create common purpose among a diverse people. That gardens provided a means to re-introduce a producer ethic that had been increasingly lost in a nation that was becoming more consumeroriented, and to educate a younger generation about their food system. And so much more of value during wars that were horrific.

One of the reasons that Americans were so receptive to the notion of planting Victory Gardens in World War II was that as a nation, we had been so profoundly affected by our experiences during the Great Depression. For citizens coming out of an extended period of economic hardship, the value of home, school and community gardens had already been proven.

Times are clearly harder now, and every day, it seems that new challenges face us. Many of these challenges are evident in what's going on with our food system. Food prices are increasing at a rapid rate. With a tightening economy, there are other impacts on our local food system: food banks have less food at a time when unemployment is growing. There is more hunger in our communities. We also struggle with a high childhood obesity rate in Ventura County, which has serious implications for the future.

One personal action we can take to help overcome some of the challenges facing us is to garden. As residents of Ventura County, we are extremely fortunate to live in a place where many fruits and vegetables can be grown year round. This provides us with an opportunity to supplement our diets in a healthy, economical and environmentally-friendly way. It also provides us with an opportunity to engage in a fun, educational and rewarding family activity. And the surplus of our efforts can be shared with friends, neighbors, and with our local food bank.

Our 4-H history is steeped in a connection to agriculture; learning about agriculture provided the rationale and reason for the 4-H program's founding. Cardening provides a way to accomplish this goal. It's also a meaningful, hands-on way to acquire important life skills, and to demonstrate leadership and citizenship, which are fundamental values and goals of our program.



CA 4-H Golden Clover Awarded to Ventura 4-H members!

Congratulations to the Ventura County 4-H members Brenda Bass, Kathy Bass, Sarah Bobardt, Ray Mini, and Chris Zack for being awarded the CA 4-H Golden Clover Award in the Fundraising category! Their entry was the educational DVD, titled "Rabbit Showmanship 101" and the 12-month calendar with small animal photographs that they created. Both were sold at the Ventura County Super Field Day. The proceeds went to the Ventura County 4-H Small Animal Science Fair. This project demonstrates innovative ways to both fulfill a need in 4-H while raising funds for 4-H activities.

Another Golden Clover Award went to a 4-H Junior and Teen Leader team in San Benito County. They challen ged members in livestock projects to donate 2% of their junior livestock auction proceeds for hunger relief in their community and world. Over 93% of their members in market livestock members accepted the challen ge and donated over \$2,300 to hunger relief organizations.

"Have Team Building Games ... Will Travel", won a Golden Clover Award for members of Humboldt, Mendocino, Nevada, Placer, and Siskiyou Counties. These five counties collaborated to create a workbook of teambuilding activities which has been distributed to 4-H programs throughout the state.

Settling In With Your New Cat

Have you considered adding a rescue kitty to your family? I did and our family is very happy with the how it has worked out. Picking out my new friend was easy. Here are some other things you might need to know.

Before you get your cat make sure that you have the basic necessities on hand. The bed and bedding litter and litter box, 2 food bowls, water bowl, carrier, collar and identity tag. Optional items might include a harness and lead, and cat door if you want your cat to have access to the outside.

When you get your new cat you need to have the right environment to make your cat feel at home. First, when you get your cat, let it sleep in the crate or kennel you bring it home in and stick a piece of your laundry in with it because that will help your cat get used to your scent.

Cats like to scratch at something, so trimming your cat's claws with toenail clippers is an easy way to lessen scratch marks. Claw sheathes are also available to glue onto the claws and can be very colorful!
