PREVENTING THE SPREAD OF COMMUNICABLE DISEASES



Each year, an average of more than 200,000 people are hospitalized and 36,000 people die from seasonal influenza (flu) complications in the United States. You can help keep yourself, your family, and your fellow 4-H volunteers and members healthy and prevent the spread of seasonal colds, flu, and other communicable diseases by practicing some simple measures at home, work, school, and other social settings. In fall of 2009, there is particular concern over the novel H1N1 influenza virus (also known as swine flu). The precautions to protect yourself from H1N1 are the same as those recommended for seasonal flu or other common communicable illnesses.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) urges you to take the following actions to protect yourself and others from the flu:

Take time to get vaccinated for seasonal influenza

- CDC recommends a yearly seasonal flu vaccine as the first and most important step in protecting against seasonal influenza. While there are many different flu viruses, the seasonal flu vaccine protects against the three seasonal viruses that research suggests will be most common.
- Vaccination is especially important for people at high risk of serious flu complications, including young children, pregnant women, people with chronic health conditions like asthma, diabetes or heart and lung disease, and people 65 years and older. Seasonal flu vaccine is also important for health care workers, and other people who live with or care for high risk people to prevent giving the flu to those at high risk.
- A seasonal vaccine will not protect you against novel H1N1. A new vaccine against novel H1N1 is being produced and will be available in the coming months as an option for prevention of novel H1N1 infection to those at greatest risk. People at greatest risk for novel H1N1 infection include children, pregnant women, and people with chronic health conditions like asthma, diabetes, or heart and lung disease.

Take everyday preventive actions

- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it. If a tissue is not available, cough or sneeze into your sleeve. An informative and amusing video on covering your sneeze can be viewed at: http://www.coughsafe.com/
- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth. Germs spread this way.
- Try to avoid close contact with sick people.
- If you are sick with flu-like illness, CDC recommends that you stay home for at least 24 hours after your fever is gone except to get medical care or for other necessities. (Your fever should be gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine.) Keep away from others as much as possible. This is to keep from making others sick.
- Visit the CDC website (http://www.cdc.gov/h1n1flu/) to find out what to do if you get sick with the flu and how to care for someone at home who is sick with the flu.

Stay Informed

In addition to the precautions above, it is important that you stay informed, especially during the upcoming flu season. Health officials will provide additional information as it becomes available. UC ANR EH&S has established a website at http://ucanr.org/h1n1 to provide links to information from CDC, the California Department of Public Health, and County Public Health Departments to help bring you national, state, and local guidance as the flu season progresses. Follow public health advice regarding school closures, avoiding crowds, and other social distancing measures. When planning for camp, consult CDC guidance (http://www.cdc.gov/h1n1flu/camp) and local public health officials and develop a plan to respond to an illness outbreak at camp.

What we should do in 4-H?

Information and guidance about the H1N1 virus is changing rapidly, but here are some general measures that we can take in 4-H.

- Make our members and their families aware of the following guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

 Stay informed. This website will be updated regularly as information becomes available.

Influenza is thought to **spread mainly person-to-person** through coughing or sneezing of infected people.

Take everyday actions to stay healthy.

- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze.
 Alcohol-based hands cleaners are also effective.
- o Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread that way.
- Stay home if you get sick. CDC recommends that you stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.
- 2. Use this information as an educational tool. Discuss prevention methods and everyday safe practices at your General Club Meetings & Project Meetings.
 - Discuss the importance of good hygiene in preventing the spread of disease.
 - Discuss the importance of staying home from work or school when sick to prevent infecting others.

JUNIOR AND TEEN LEADERS

IV. JUNIOR AND TEEN LEADERS

- A. The junior and teen leadership experience is designed to provide members with the opportunity to learn about the qualities and competencies needed to be a leader. Leadership is not doing things for the group, it is helping the group decide what needs to be done and how. Junior leaders provide assistance while teen leaders assume more challenging leadership roles. Junior and teen leaders complete a <u>Junior and Teen Leadership Development Report</u>. The major duties of a junior or teen leader are (varies by age, experience, and other):
 - 1. Work collaboratively with the adult volunteer to set goals, develop lesson plans, teach skills, and evaluate the activity.
 - 2. Coordinate logistical details such as meeting times, locations, materials and supplies, and expenses with the adult leader.
 - 3. Communicate with the adult leader and members about group expectations, responsibilities and expected outcomes.

B. Criteria

- 1. Junior leaders (intermediate members): To become a junior leader, member must be in grades 6-8, or if home-schooled, must be at least 11 and no more than 13 years old as of December 31 of the program year.
- 2. Teen leaders (senior members): To become a teen leader, member must be in the ninth grade or above, or if home-schooled, must be at least 14 years old as of December 31 of the program year.

C. Liability Coverage for Junior and Teen Leaders

- 1. Junior and teen leaders are not covered by UC's liability insurance, which applies only to adult volunteers. UC's liability insurance does not cover 4-H members at any time. As junior and teen leaders, members have sufficient knowledge and experience to function in teaching and administrative roles, but they are unable to assume the responsibilities of adult volunteers. See <u>General Liability and Automobile Insurance</u> FAQ.
- 2. Members under the age of 18 may not drive other members on 4-H business at any time.

Volunteering at the Rescue Mission is super fun and it is an especially fun


